

GDP: Montgomery County 2001 - 2023 (Billions, \$2017)








Elements of Population ChangeMontgomery County, MD








Payroll EmploymentWashington MSA (2012-2025)








Total EmploymentWashington MSA Jurisdictions (2010-2025)








Total Employment % Change from January 2010








Professional Scientific and Technical Emp.Washington MSA Jurisdictions (2010-2025)








Prof. Scientific and Technical Employment % Change from January 2010








Federal EmploymentWashington MSA Jurisdictions (2010-2025)








Federal Employment % Change from January 2010








Average Hourly Wage (Private) 2015 - 2025








Labor Force and Unemployment Rate Montgomery County








Total Employment 2010 to 2025








Total Employment Percent Change From 2010








Housing Units Montgomery, Dallas








Housing Units Percent Change from 2010








Multi-Family Construction Starts Montgomery County







Summary



Concerns

- 5 year-over-year economic contractions since sequester
- Domestic out-migration since sequester
- Lowest employment gains in the region since 2010 (Tie-DC)
- Scientific and Technical Employment losses since 2022
- Most negatively impacted in Washington Region by DOGE
- Rising unemployment
- COVID labor force contraction never recovered
- Average Hourly Wages declining
- Little housing construction
- Zero Multi-Family construction starts

Assets

- Nice place to live
- Good schools
- Great Assets: NIH, NOAA, Metro

Outlook

Difficult several years ahead, but:

Montgomery has all the elements to be competitive, so our future is in our hands.
